#### COCKTAILS:

Normally one half hour to an hour in duration. Music is generally light jazz, adult contemporary or big band to set the proper mood and create an elegant ambiance. Special attention is given to volume, especially during the cocktail and dinner hours. Nothing disrupts a formal atmosphere more than music played too loud!



#### DINNER

Generally, an hour to an hour and a half should be budgeted for dinner service.
